The San Antonio Chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas invites you to hear David K. Langford present "Water 101" on Tuesday, January 28th at 6:30 pm at Lions Field Adult Center (2809 Broadway at the corner of Mulberry & Broadway by Brackenridge Park)

David K. Langford has served in the leadership of the Texas Wildlife Association since 1986. He was TWA's Executive Vice President from 1990 until his partial retirement in 2002. Langford now occasionally serves TWA by working on water issues and other special educational projects. In his "Water 101" program David will attempt to make us aware of the complex web of policies, policy makers, and jurisdictions that determine–usually with little input at all from us–how water flows from its source to our faucets, and who makes the decisions during this journey. He intends for us to walk out of the meeting armed with the knowledge we need to get answers to our water questions, to understand what we read about water issues, and, most importantly of all, to advocate effectively for environmentally sensible management of our most crucial resource. He will provide a detailed reference handout that will extend his comments and offer points of contact for engaging in water-related advocacy.

The UTSA College of Architecture's 2014 Spring Lecture Series begins with a lecture by John Massengale and Victor Dover on **the Art of Street Design on Wednesday, January 29th at 5:30 pm**.in the Southwest Room of the Durango Building at the UTSA Downtown Campus (Room db1.124). The event is free and open to the public.

Massengale and Dover know how to fix America's neighborhoods, cities, and towns: make them walkable again. That begins with streets where people want to be. In their joint talk, Massengale and Dover will show some of the hundreds of streets included in their book, Street Design: The Secret to Great Cities and Towns, and talk about what works and what doesn't. Autographed copies of Street Design will be on sale after the talk. This innovative and easy-to-use guide analyzes great streets around the world and teaches techniques for making comfortable, safe, and enticing streets.

John Massengale, AIA, is an international thought leader on the connections between urban design, architecture, walkability, and placemaking. As principal at Massengale & Co. and the author of three books, he has more than 25 years of experience designing projects in Europe and across America. Massengale's planning work spans a range of situations from suburban retrofits and designing new towns to urban infill and urban regeneration. Victor Dover is an urban designer, city planner, and co-founder of Dover, Kohl & Partners Town Planning. He serves as principal-in-charge for many of the firm's design and planning projects. He lectures widely around the nation on the topics of livable communities and sustainable development, was national chair of the Congress for the New Urbanism (CNU) from 2010-2012, and is a Fellow of the American Institute of Certified Planners.

The San Antonio Express-News/UTSA will host a Town Hall meeting on "**Planning San Antonio's Water Future**" at 7 p.m. on **February 6th**. The event will be in the Aula Canaria Room of the Buena Vista Building (Room 1.328) at UTSA's downtown campus. It will be open to the public and admission is free. Parking has been reserved in Lot D3.

The panel of water experts will include SAWS CEO and President Robert Puente, state Rep. Lyle Larson, who has become the Bexar County legislative delegation's water guru, and Juan Gomez, deputy director and associate professor of research for the UTSA Sustainable Energy Institute.
