

*Land Conservation Options for Comal County was* a big success! Dear GEAA members and friends,

About 100 people came out on a cold rainy night last week to participate in a discussion of <u>Land Conservation Options for Comal County</u> at the McKenna Center in New Braunfels. Judging from the feedback and the great turnout, we believe it was an evening well-spent. A <u>panel discussion</u> that included presentations from regional <u>experts</u> outlined what other individuals, groups, and counties are doing to preserve open space in the Edwards and Trinity Aquifer regions. Most of us are aware of the <u>growth predicted for communities along the IH 35</u> <u>corridor</u> between San Antonio and Austin. GEAA member groups like <u>San Marcos</u> <u>River Foundation</u>, <u>Save Our Springs Alliance</u>, and <u>Wimberley Valley Watershed</u> <u>Association</u> have made real progress in permanently protecting parcels of land that are crucial to delivering clean stormwater to recharge San Marcos and Barton springs and Jacobs Well. Within the past month San Marcos City Council <u>voted to</u> <u>enter a lease-purchase agreement</u> with the Trust for Public Land to purchase 102 acres of undeveloped land, while Travis County citizens approved <u>\$16 million in</u> <u>bond funding</u> that will go towards conservation easements aimed at preserving open space and protecting water quality.

It was clear that many in attendance were inspired to engage in future efforts to emulate these projects in Comal County. GEAA and co-presenters, <u>League of</u> <u>Women Voters of the Comal Area</u> and the <u>Hill Country Alliance</u>, are thrilled that there seems to be a desire to keep exploring – and acting on – options for preserving precious tracts of land in Comal County that contribute clean water to

our springs and rivers and, that make Comal one of the most beautiful counties in Texas.
