This week we got a packet of letters in the mail from Zamora Middle School students thanking GEAA and [Rackspace](#) for teaching them about the Edwards Aquifer.

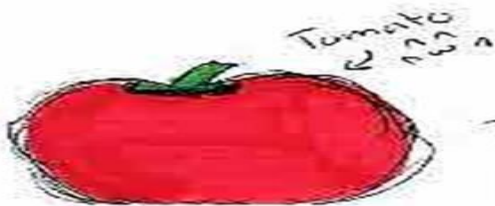
