Cibolo Center for Conservation

The Cibolo Center for Conservation's participation as one of GEAA's earliest member organizations has been among our most gratifying partnerships as we have worked together to advance our shared mission of protecting our Hill Country waterways!

Started in 1988, The Cibolo's Founder and CEO, Carolyn Chipman Evans, and a group of friends were cleaning up the Cibolo Creek. Now 36 years later through immersive experiences in nature, both curated and self-guided, the Cibolo helps to provide a direct connection to land, water and wildlife creating a natural and cultural link to the heritage of our region.

Located in Boerne, Texas, their two adjacent campuses, the Cibolo Nature Center (100-acres) and the historic Herff Farm (60-acres), offers miles of trails, four distinct ecosystems and protection for our fragile Cibolo Creek watershed that contributes millions of gallons a day to the Trinity and Edwards Aquifers, the primary source of drinking water for our region. Establishing themselves as a leader in regional conservation, outdoor recreation, community connection and environmental education in our rapidly growing region of Texas, The Cibolo welcomes guests into a beautiful natural Texas Hill Country setting for nature education, enriching community experiences, and environmental research in action.
